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My name is Rebecca Goldberger. I am called to serve Christ and humanity as a sister with the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This is my story.

In the Beginning

I am the youngest of four children and was born and raised in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The Catholic faith was an important part of my upbringing. We attended Mass every weekend, prayed together, attended Catholic school, and were involved in the life of our parish. I also learned a great deal about the faith from my grandparents. My grandmother was a devout Catholic, and I loved to look through all of her religious books and listen to her speak fondly of my patron saint, St. Therese of Lisieux.

My Faith

From an early age, I had a very specific idea of what I wanted my life to look like, and I was determined to make that vision a reality no matter what. I wanted a husband, children, and a career in healthcare. Religious life wasn't even a consideration. In fact, during my late teens and early twenties I strayed from the faith: I married outside of the Church, earned a Bachelor's degree from the University of New Mexico, obtained a Master's degree from New Mexico State University, and became a Registered Dietician.

When my marriage ended in divorce just a few years later, it ushered in the most painful – and transformative – chapter in my life. At that time, I began to realize not only how far I'd drifted from the Catholic Church, but also how much I missed it. I went to confession for the first time in years, started attending daily Mass, and went to adoration regularly.

My Vocation

Soon after returning to the faith, I started to wonder about religious life. It had never been part of my plan; however, the thought kept returning. The idea of giving up my possessions, my career, and control of my life was frightening, and I continued to dismiss the idea until the pandemic began.

Then, witnessing the amount of suffering people were experiencing made it clear to me I wanted to devote my life entirely to loving God and serving others.

I was unsure what to do next. Overwhelmed by the number of religious communities, I used the National Religious Vocation Conference Vocation Match tool, and one of my matches was the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus (ASCJ). Although I browsed a number of different communities, something kept drawing me back to the Apostles.


Called to Serve

On the ASCJ website they ask, "Does the thought of becoming a religious sister excite you and at the same time frighten you?" I'd never had the words to describe how I felt about religious life until then. After a good deal of prayer and reflection I reached out to ASCJ virtually, and the more Apostle sisters I met, the more interested I became in their community. There is so much joy and laughter whenever I interact with the sisters, and I feel more at home with them than with other communities I've contacted.

The Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus describe themselves as apostles of love. They work in several ministries, but no matter what activity an Apostle is engaged in, her main purpose is to bring everyone she meets to the Heart of Jesus, where they will be loved beyond measure. In the Heart of Jesus, all of our wounds are healed: I understand this from my own experiences. My dream is to consecrate myself to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and bring His love to others.

A recent study confirmed that nearly 1 of every 2 aspirants is blocked from entering seminaries and religious communities due to student loan debt. It is the only thing that prevents many from entering formation to become a priest, sister or brother. My classmates are discerning all over the country.

Trains each aspirant in Catholic-based philanthropy

Mentors each aspirant to build a unified team; each individual works toward the collective goal

Provides ongoing accountability and personal guidance to ensure proper preparation and completion of the individual fundraising plans of each aspirant

Equips each aspirant with an online fundraising platform and multi-media fundraising tools
