# In the Beginning

I was blessed to be born into a Catholic family. We lived a good but humble life, as my parents made many sacrifices to make a Catholic education possible for me and my 11 siblings. Throughout those formative years, I cultivated an interest in math and science and set my sights on becoming a medical doctor. I wanted to help people in need, and medicine seemed a wonderful career opportunity to do just that.

In my early teens, I felt a force deep within drawing me towards the priesthood. I kept these thoughts to myself, but started to experience moments of my soul "catching fire" during the Mass at the words of consecration. These moments continued for a few years, and as graduation from high school was looming, God seemed to be asking me to make a choice: pursue the Catholic priesthood, or continue advancing towards my goal of becoming a doctor.

I attended a Catholic university and throughout my undergraduate studies, I regularly received the sacraments and made lifelong friends through the Catholic Student Organization. God continued to call, and the priesthood was an inescapable theme. In four short years, a graduation was once more approaching and again, I felt God asking me to make a choice.

## My Vocation

I began to keep God at "arm's length," and year by year, my academic achievements and honors grew as my personal faith life weakened. My spiritual life received a huge blow when the coronavirus pandemic began to spread throughout the U.S. and the Archdiocese gave a dispensation that lifted the obligation to attend Mass.

One night, while in my third year of medical school, I was trying to fall asleep when suddenly the thought came that maybe I should really think about being a priest. I almost laughed aloud. It had been nearly six years since

I reflected on the comparison of being a doctor of the body and a doctor of the soul. Even in helping hundreds of people with their physical health, the years impacted are finite. In leading even one soul to God, the results are eternal. Through the Sacraments, in particular Confession and Last Rites, the soul gets prepared for eternity. I responded to this invitation by placing everything I had into God's hands.


#### Called to Serve



This means that I am a fundraiser for a class of aspiring priests, sisters and brothers. A recent study confirmed that nearly one out of every two aspirants is blocked from entering seminaries and religious communities due to student loan debt. It is the only thing that prevents many from entering formation to become a priest, sister or brother. My classmates are discerning all over the nation.

# Why is Labouré Needed?



The average amount of educational loans blocking aspirants in Labouré from answering God's call\*



Many religious communities cannot afford to assume their aspirants' loan debts



Most dioceses will allow some debt but have a limited threshold for acceptance



Supported by 80+ bishops & 250+ religious institutions to help deliver their aspirants

### How does the Mission Work?



Are discerning a vocation and have been selected into a diocese or religious institute

Are blocked from entering or continuing vocational formation due to student loans

Are trained by Labouré in Catholic-based fundraising and are provided with practical tools, personal mentoring and accountability

Share their vocation stories with thousands of Catholic donors, thereby building a culture of vocations and evangelization

As a class, aspirants raise funds collectively and receive awards from those funds to be applied to their debt



Works with aspirants to utilize all personal means to mitigate their loan amount upon joining the program

Trains each aspirant in Catholic-based philanthropy

Mentors each aspirant to build a unified class; each individual works toward the collective goal

Accompanies each aspirant through ongoing accountability and guidance to ensure successful completion of individual and class fundraising plans

Equips each aspirant with an online fundraising platform and multi-media fundraising tools

Facilitates ongoing aspirant/donor communication and updates after aspirant enters formation

## What Has Labouré Accomplished?

\*According to 2022 Forbes Magazine, the national average education loan debt can be as high as \$40k. For aspirants in the Labouré program the average debt is \$60k-80k.
The Labouré Society is a recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofit, and is listed in the Official Catholic Directory. All donations are tax deductible. Gifts solicited by our aspirants belong to Labouré and are dispersed upon board-approved guidelines to ensure full compliance with IRS rulings. All gifts made to Labouré are non-refundable. Aspirants who leave Labouré are not required to repay any funds disbursed but are strongly encouraged to support Labouré however possible. Funds granted but not dispersed to a former aspirant are made available to other Labouré needs.
